#### Your Neighborhood Watch - Be Part of It!

Whether you know it or not, the WK Neighborhood Watch program and volunteers are working for YOU every weekend. This program has been extremely successful over the years and relies on the willingness of many of our WK neighbors to do **one patrol a year** on a weekend evening. But every program must evolve and so the Neighborhood Watch is now evolving to adopt some new procedures – most significantly, the use of email and an online calendar to schedule volunteers for patrols.

If you're new to Neighborhood Watch, or have volunteered with the Watch for years, please read on to learn about the *updated* Neighborhood Watch – and then use your WKCA membership form to indicate your interest in participating as a Patrol or Base/Watch Captain. No experience is necessary – training is provided.

What is the Neighborhood Watch Program? Simply put, its neighbors watching out for each other's property. This is a tested method of deterring crime and has been well supported by our community over the years. In Winston Knolls, it's traditionally been a team of three members working on Friday and Saturday evenings between 9:00pm and 12:00 midnight to provide a mobile PATROL (two people) in the neighborhood to report any suspicious activity to the BASE (1 person), who may alert the police, the owner(s) at the address of the activity, or both. Either the patrol or base can log time, location, and notes of events in the Patrol Log.

How is my Watch assignment scheduled? In past years, we had four NW Team Leaders, and the volunteers who signed up for the Watch were divided between these four Leaders. Team Leaders had to cover one weekend a month and would use phone calls (primarily) to schedule volunteers for patrols and base. We are now transitioning to an email and online calendar system that will alert our volunteers that the calendar is out and ask them to go to the calendar and select a date for their patrol. We believe this will be a far more efficient and effective method of scheduling; reducing phoning and allowing ALL of our volunteers access to each weekend, instead of just a quarter of the group. We expect the calendar to be posted quarterly for signups. Email reminders will be sent a week before your selected patrol date. Our Neighborhood Watch Coordinator will manage the scheduling process. Anyone preferring phone contact can indicate that at signup and your contact will be made over the phone.

What does the Patrol do? The Patrol is always 2 people. That can be 2 people who wish to serve together, such as a husband and wife, 2 neighbors, or a parent and responsible teenage son or daughter. (This is a great way to get some service hours for school, scouts or youth groups!) Volunteers can also be paired up and get to know someone new. The Patrol members pick up their patrol materials – maps, clipboard, spotlight, signs for the car, patrol log – from the Base/Watch Captain, and receive an update on any Watch alerts or special things to watch or look for during the patrol. Contact information is exchanged. A new Watch volunteer will always be trained by the Watch Captain prior to going out, or paired with an experienced volunteer. The Patrol then drives the neighborhood, calling in to the Watch Captain (Base) as needed. Most patrols are routine, but in the event of real emergency the Patrol should first call 911, then call the Base, and then note in the patrol log any details they can obtain from a safe distance. WE DO NOT GET OUT OF THE VEHICLE OR CONFRONT ANYONE. Your role as a Patrol is simply to call in suspicious activity – we allow the police to investigate it. At the end of the Patrol, all materials are returned to the Base.

What does the Base/Watch Captain do? Instead of Team Leaders, we will now maintain a group of at least 8 regular Base volunteers who will serve as Base (now referred to as Watch Captain) for the patrols approximately 5-6 weekends/year. These Watch Captains will be able to schedule their weekends in advance to avoid conflicts with other commitments, and will be informed of those working their Patrols from the online calendar. The Watch Captain will send out the Patrol, providing the materials, training, and any needed Watch alerts, and then will serve as Base while the Patrol is out. Should the Patrol call in with a report of an open garage door or broken street lights, the Base will take note and make any needed phone calls to alert the affected neighbor. The Base/Watch Captain will collect back all the Patrol materials at the end of the night and then provide a brief report of the weekend activity to the NW Coordinator.

This is a great way for someone who is not comfortable driving at night, has small children at home, or does not wish to serve as a Patrol volunteer, to participate in the program and perform an important role for our community. If you tend to be home watching DVD's or playing with the kids on weekend evenings, you could do that AND serve the community in this role. The role of Base/Watch Captain could even be performed by a responsible teenager for service hours, provided it was overseen by a parent who is present during the Patrol.

How can I help? The continued success of this program does require at least 100 active volunteers each year, so please join up on the directory/membership form in this newsletter. Indicate your preference as Patrol or Watch Captain/Base. A call to the installer revealed that some of the parts had been put in incorrectly. Not good. The parts were replaced and re-installed...and the water problem 'evaporated'. The moral of the story: when you have a problem, ask yourself "What has changed?" Sometimes the answer is there all along.

#### Spotlighting BGR (The Burger Joint)...

I don't care much for red meat. I can walk away from a rib eye steak without a second glance. But occasionally I get hungry for a hamburger. A real hamburger, not one from McDonald's or Burger King. So I was happy to see *The Burger Joint* coming to the Whole Foods Shopping Center. I'm not exactly sure what the name of that shopping center is, but *The Burger Joint* is located between Washington Sport Club- where you can burn off the extra calories before consuming the hamburger - and Whole Foods, whose healthy lifestyle will try to pull you away from *The Burger Joint*.

This eatery does not open until Friday Jan. 28th, so I was not able to give it a taste test before this edition of WK newsletter went to press. But the menu looks very interesting. In addition to standard french fries made with thick cut Yukon Gold Potatoes, they offer sweet potato fries and asparagus spears grilled and sprinkled with parmesan cheese. They have several varieties of burgers all served on a fresh toasted buttery brioche bun. They also have freshly ground and seasoned turkey burgers. In addition to sodas and milkshakes, they carry beer and half bottles of wine. They have a small area for dine in and eventually hope to offer delivery. So although I can't personally vouch for the taste of these burgers, I am definitely going to get there next week to find out first hand if this new eating place is a keeper. I'll let you know.
